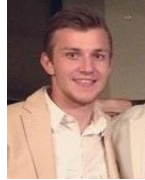

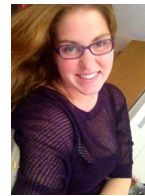

The CTU Strike

“Better schools are a right! That is why we have to fight!” “Students’ needs, not corporate greed!” These chants could be heard outside of schools everywhere when Chicago Teachers Union (CTU) agreed not to enter classrooms on September 10, leaving over 350,000 students out of the classroom.

Much of the media coverage had been in regards to salary but Chicago teachers were fighting for much more than that. Karen Lewis proudly proclaimed the success of agreeing to provide textbooks to students on the first day of school, rather than waiting for materials to be delivered. Negotiations were also successfully made to keep art, music, technology, physical education, and language teachers in the classroom. Even with an increasing emphasis on math and science performance on standardized tests, CTU successfully fought to keep a well-rounded curriculum. Despite these accomplishments, the focus on the topic of salary remained. After failing to receive their contracted 4% raise last year, CPS teachers were looking to receive a raise that took both this and the longer school day into account. Currently,



Chicago Public School teachers are estimated to earn a median salary of about \$71,000. However, most stories fail to recognize the fact that Chicago Public School teachers are required to live in the city in order to teach in the district, resulting in a higher cost of living and higher taxation. Another sticking point that remained was the new teacher evaluation model being pushed by the district. The fight over standardized testing represents a critical stance on the current shift in education. We all witnessed the first major move towards standardized testing through the introduction of No Child Left Behind, which tied federal funding to school performance on tests. However, the focus no longer rests on the school as a whole entity, but rather the individual teacher and his or her impact on the student. On September 9, Lewis voiced the union’s concerns saying, “We are also concerned that too much of the new evaluations will be based on students’ standardized test scores. This is no way to measure teacher effectiveness at all. Further, there are too many fac-

tors beyond our control which will impact on how some of our students perform on those standardized tests. Those factors include poverty, which no one wants to talk about, exposure to violence, which over this past summer, as we all know, has increased exponentially, homelessness, hunger, and other social issues beyond our control. Evaluate us on what we do. Not the lives of our children that we do

not control.” Chicago Public School students are some of the most diverse in the nation, and Lewis’s statement echoes throughout the nation: just how do you measure teacher quality with so many different variables affecting student achievement? Different news sources have both criticized and acclaimed the union for its actions. And this strike was one that gained national attention, demonstrating the power of unions to enact change.

IEA Student Benefits!

Dues Rebate After Graduation-A \$20 rebate (up to \$80 total) is available for IEA Student Program members as they enter the profession and become active, teaching members of the IEA in various school districts throughout the state.

Many Publications- Student members receive many publications distributed to practicing teachers and members. These include *NEA Today* and *The Advocate*. Both are excellent resources for any pre-professional. In addition, the IEA Student Program Officers write a newsletter called *Student Speak* that all student members will receive at least once a semester.

Statewide Student Conferences are held twice a year. Registration is typically \$55 for sessions and

overnight hotel if four students room together. A variety of sessions related to pre-professional needs are offered at the conference. Come join us to learn a lot and meet other college students with your same interests!

Professional development workshops - Campus meetings often include workshops, guest speakers, and panels of practicing educators and school administrators.

NEA Grants-Student members have an opportunity to write grants and to receive up to \$1000 per project for activities in local schools and communities, deadlines to apply are August 31 and November 30! Community service is a great way to get involved locally and provide valuable experience to you for your future career in teaching!

Student Scholarships -The IEA Student Program typically awards up to eight \$1000 scholarships each spring. The application process is relatively easy and the \$1000 can be used for almost any educational need identified by the recipient.

Mini-resumes-Our office will ask students who are graduating to complete a job survey form. The information is then compiled and distributed to all superintendents in the state of Illinois.

Liability Insurance - Each student member receives one million dollars in insurance liability.
